

architectural drawings of the four elevations of the building, together with drawings for the foundation, the main floor and the lower floor - for both an entirely new, masonry building; and for a structure comprising a new foundation but with the old building moved to a position on top.

The specifications, 26 pages, were summarized page by page by Miss Stillwell, and each item discussed by the group. A person-to-person expression of opinion regarding underpinning and walls revealed that ^{for a number of} the members were unanimous in choosing Tawacite blocks and in preferring - as first choice - alternate rows of 8" x 16" and 4" x 16" blocks, and - as second choice - two rows of 8" x 16" blocks to one of 4" x 16". It was voted to leave the question of inclosing the blocks in brick until such time in the future as more money should be available.

It was voted that Mr. Lockwood's blueprints and specifications be accepted and used as the basis for securing bids; that bids should be sought from A. C. Beak & Co. of Providence, A. H. Leeming & Sons of Providence, Ernest F. Hopkins of Chapachet, Arthur Newton of Pawtucket, and such other firm as Mr. Lockwood might suggest; and that bids be called for September 15th.

The questions of lighting fixtures and of shoving occasioned considerable discussion but ^{were} left for future consideration. The meeting was then adjourned.
