

Oct. 30, 1957 further voted that the President should investigate the legal requirements regarding the Librarian's salary and that if not in accord with our practice the salary should be increased to the required amount.

A citation was given Mrs Calderasa and Mrs Thomas W. Hall for their faithful attendance at the Library during the months' interval between Mrs Scott's resignation and Mrs Dexter's appointment.

It was announced that Professor Smiley of Brown University had agreed to speak on Sunday afternoon November 24th at the Library Association meeting on "Sputnik," the first Russian satellite, which would still be visible as it whirled around the earth, in outer space. It was voted to pay Professor Smiley \$25, which he had agreed to accept, although much less than his usual fee. It was voted that, following his talk, simple refreshments should be served upstairs with Mrs Scott, Mrs Tyng, and Mrs Lockwood as hostesses.

It was voted that the President should ask the State to re-imburse the Library for the former's share of such sums as were paid to those who substituted at the library in the interval between Librarians.

The President announced that within the year the circulation of children's books had increased 134%, and adult circulation 78%.

The meeting then adjourned for roundtable discussions, and glasses of cool cider provided by Mrs Lockwood.
