

of Greenville or nearby communities. Miss Stillwell displayed samples of notepaper and Christmas cards bearing Greenville scenes reproduced from pen-and-ink drawings by Donald B. Thurman, the sale of which would be launched at the Festival; and told of the Food Sale to be held at the Festival on Sept. 13, solicitation for which had been turned over to an outstanding member of each of the churches of Greenville.

Mr. Moore told of having secured \$21.00 from the Treasurer to be divided and used as initial cash at the notepaper, Xmas card, and Food Sale tables. It was voted that each table should return its initial cash before counting its profits. Mr. Scott agreed to act as Treasurer for the Festival.

Miss Stillwell told of the gift from a friend of the sum of forty dollars offered towards a lecture to be given by Mrs. Stephen W. Gifford of Exbury, if that should be desirable. Since Mrs. Gifford's fee proves to fifty dollars, it was voted that the library appropriate \$10.00 to complete the payment and that Mrs. Gifford be asked to speak on Louisa May Alcott on November 9 or 16 at the library's celebration of Children's Book Week.

The President described two extension courses in library training to be given this winter in Providence under the auspices of the University of Rhode Island. It was voted that Mrs. Dexter be allowed to take both courses, the fee to be paid by the library. Since attending these courses will necessitate Mrs. Dexter's leaving the library at six o'clock on Wednesdays, it was voted that volunteers should be secured for the hours from six to eight o'clock. Mrs. Scott graciously offered her services for these hours on the last two Wednesdays of the month, and Mr. Moore offered to fill in when possible, during the first semester.

The meeting was thus adjourned.
