

Mr. Moore reported the gift from Miss Alice M. Comstock of a new, card-catalogue case, which had been installed just before the meeting. Mr. Fernald reported that a cement surface had been laid on the parking area by the Gammino Company at a cost of \$1025.00, the lowest of three bids received; and that this expense had been met by joint subscriptions secured by Miss Stillwell from Mrs. Austin T. Levy of Harrisville and Miss Jessie G. Vallau of Providence.

Mrs. Moore, who was in charge of the Junior Arts and Crafts Festival held on November 7th and 8th, reported it was a great success, and that attendance was good in spite of a severe storm. The show consisted of articles made by children during the Smithfield Recreational Program, photographs, jewelry, hand weaving, a hand-made crossbow, and paintings by various junior artists, ^{pupils of Mr. John Gallagher (as described in detail in The Observer of November 19th.)} The young people, Mrs. Moore said, had a successful Junior Food Sale of their own, in charge of Diane Dexter. And a larger table, in charge of Mrs. C. Franklin Lockwood, was abundantly stocked by committees from the three local churches. The proceeds from the sales at the Festival were: from new books, \$19.22; old books, \$31.50; cards and notepaper, \$12.25; and food sale, \$96.58 - making a total of \$158.35.

Miss Stillwell reported on plans of the Activities Committee for a Candelight and Carol Festival on Sunday, December 13, at which time there would be poetry readings by Professor Sharon Brown of Brown University and songs by a Pembroke Singing Group, in addition to the general singing of carols to be led by Mr. Joseph Lopez of Greenville.

As a result of the parking area there was
